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## Elephant

- •Pronunciation-(**el·e·phant**)
- •Definition- a very large animal with thick grey skin, large ears, and two curved outer teeth called tusks.
- •History- It has both a Greek and Latin origin. The Greek origin "Elephas" meaning beast. The roots of the word elephant in Latin divided into two words "ele" which means Arch and "phant" meaning Huge.



#### **Animal**



- Pronunciation-(an-uh-muhl)
- •Definition-any member of the kingdom Animalia, comprising multicellular organisms that have a well-defined shape and usually limited growth, can move voluntarily, actively acquire food and digest it internally, and have sensory and nervous systems that allow them to respond rapidly to stimuli.
- •History-"any living creature" (including humans), from Latin animale "living being, being which breathes.

#### Luke



- Pronunciation- (L-ew-k)
- •Meaning and history-English form of the Greek name  $\Lambda o \nu \kappa \alpha \varsigma$  (Loukas) which meant "from Lucania", Lucania being a region in Italy. Saint Luke, the author of the third Gospel and Acts in the New Testament, was a doctor who travelled in the company of Saint Paul. Due to his renown, the name became common in the Christian world (in various spellings). As an English name, Luke has been in use since the 12th century. A famous fictional bearer was the hero Luke Skywalker from the 'Star Wars' movies.
