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RIDE

- verb (used without object), rode or (Archaic) rid; rid·den or (Archaic) rid; rid·ing.
- It means to be borne along on or in a vehicle or other kind of conveyance.
- Example: Every weekend I go ride my dirt bike.
- 1759, "journey on the back of a horse or in a vehicle," from ride (verb.); slang meaning "a motor vehicle" is recorded from 1930;

- I like to ride my dirt bike every weekend!

RACE

- 1640s of persons; 1793 of vehicles, agent noun from race (verb.).
- It means to have a race between multiple vehicles.
- Example; every Saturday afternoon I go and race my dirt bike in Chandlerville.

RACE

- I like to race a lot of people when I race.



Chandler

- maker or seller of candles," late 14centuary., attested as a surname from late 13c. (also, from early 14century. "candle-holder;" see chandelier), from Old French chandelier
- It means the maker of a candle or candles.

Information on the name chandler

- A **Chandler** was the head of the chandlery in medieval households, responsible for wax, candles, and soap.
- One of the guys name in the show Friends is named chandler.

Chandler can also be a male or female name.
