- a person who serves in an army, a person engaged in military service.
- an enlisted man or woman, as distinguished from a commissioned officer





Semi

[sem-ee, sem-ahy]

- **▶** Noun
- Origin- middle English
- a combining form borrowed from Latin, meaning half, freely prefixed to English words of any origin, now sometimes with the senses partially, incompletely, somewhat
- Some use the word semi for "semi truck".



Lindsey

[LINDZ-ee] [lind-zee, lin-]

- **▶** Noun
- **▶** Origin- England
- **▶** English, Scottish
- ► Ranked #572 in the US
- ► From an English and Scottish surname which was originally derived from the name of the region Lindsey, which means "LINCOLN island" in Old English. As a given name it was usually masculine until the 1970s, when it became popular for girls, probably due to its similarity to Linda and because of American actress Lindsay Wagner (1949-).



Edward

[ed-werd]

- **▶** Noun
- **▶** Ranked- #145 in U.S.
- **▶ Used around 1895-1930**
- ▶ Origin- wales, Scottland
- ► Means "rich guard", derived from the Old English elements ead "wealth, fortune" and weird "guard"



Corey

[kawr-ee, kohr-ee]

- **Noun**
- Origin- England
- Ranked- #359 in U.S.
- From a surname which was derived from the Old Norse given name Kóri, of unknown meaning. This name became popular in the 1960s due to the character Corey Baker on the television series 'Julia'.
