- noun
- The British slang for umbrella.
- The slang likely originated in Britain in 1866



switcheroo



- [swich-uh-roo, swich-uh-roo]
- A slang word meaning unexpected or sudden change or reverse in attitude, character, position, or action.
- This term most likely originated in 1930 – 1935.



Paige

- Payj
- proper noun
- French and English surname meaning servant.
- Derived from old French and Italian
- Rank 128th in the United States



Nichole

- nee-KOL (**French**), ni-KOL (**English**)
- proper noun
- Meaning in French and English
people's victory
- Originating from France in the late
20th century as the feminine variation
of Nicholas.



Otto

- AW-to (German), AH-to (English), OT-to (Finnish)
- proper noun
- Meaning wealthy
- The name originates from ancient Germany. It was the name of the four kings of Germany starting in the 10th century with Otto, the first Holy Roman Emperor known as Otto the Great.
