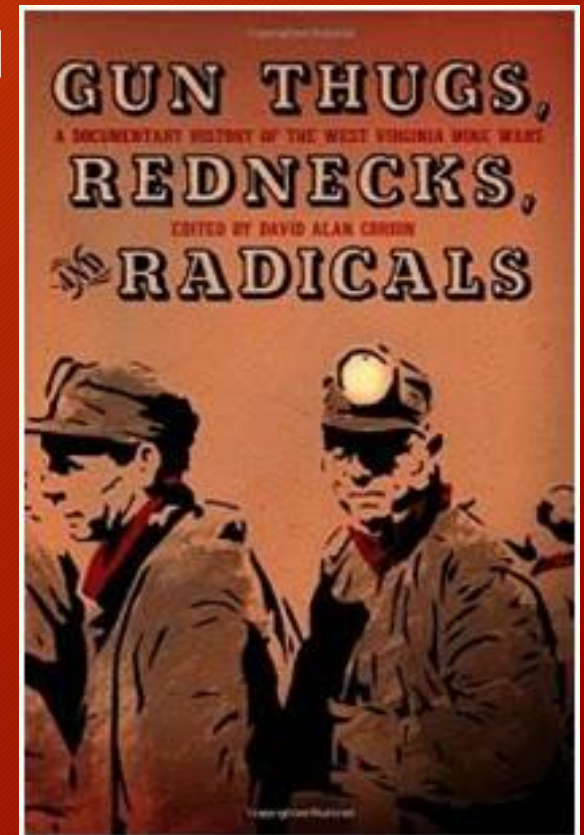
Camouflage or camo [kam-uh-flahzh]

- the act, means, or result of obscuring things to deceive an enemy, as by painting or screening objects so that they are lost to view in the background



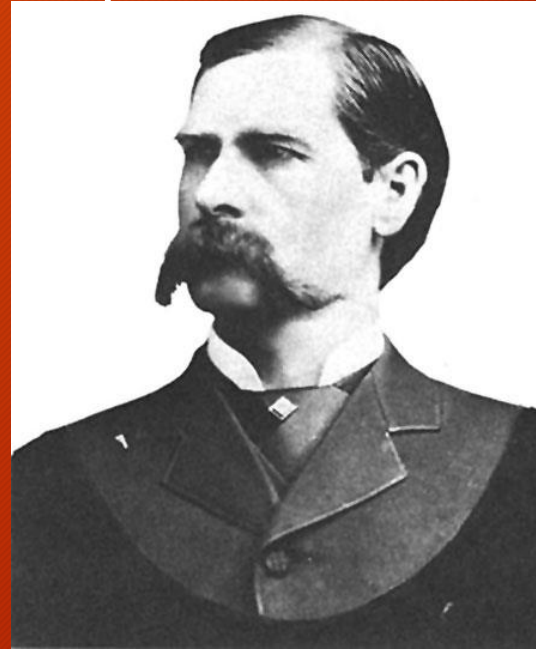
Redneck [red-nek]
