Bassoon

Etymology

Originated first from the French *basson* and the Italian term *bassone* both meaning bass and adding the suffix meaning “one bass”

Bassoon Definition

A musical instrument that has a double reed and ranges from both tenor and bass (really high and really low).

Etymology

Came from the French word *medlee* meaning a combination or mixture.

Was also used in the English language to mean a fight, brawl, or rumble

The Archaic definition was a fight or battle, where as, today we use it to mean a collection or mixture of things usually associated with music or a musical collection



Blizzard

Definition

Blizzard is a violent snow storm and typically has violent winds as well as snow, hail, or rain.

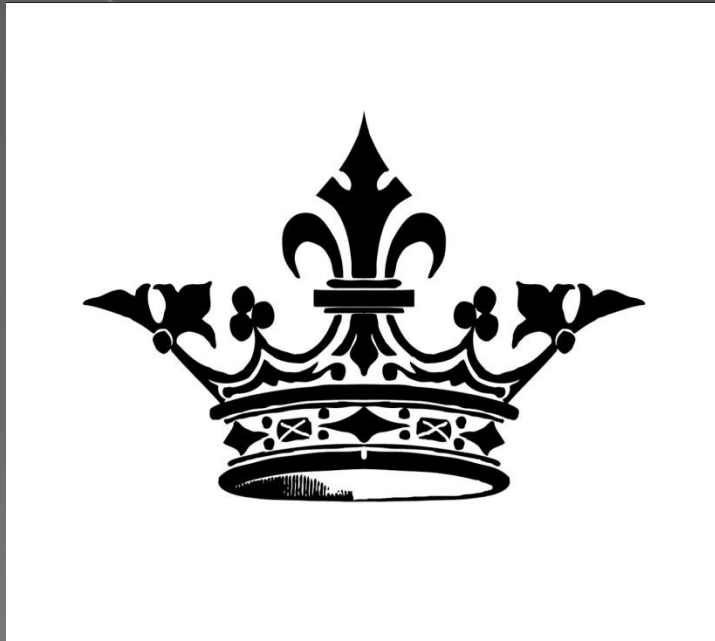
Etymology

Has a very obscure origin and therefore is unknown. The word itself means violent winds and might somehow be connected with the word blazes origin.

Steven/Stephen

Steven derived from the name Stephen which had came from the Latin *Stephanus* or the Greek term *Stephanos* which translates to crown.



The name Stephen in English was exclusively given to monks until after the crusades. It was only popularized in the 1960s as Steven and was one of Americas top 20 name given to newborns between 1949 and 1976.

Leonard



In French it is Leonard comes from the German name *Leonhard* meaning heart of a lion or brave. in High German it is *Lewerhart* which means “strength of a lion”
