# Emotional

1821, "pertaining to emotion," from emotion + -al (1). Meaning "liable to emotions" attested by 1857. Related: Emotionally. Emotional intelligence coined by mid-1960s, popular from mid-1980s.



- early 13<sup>th</sup> century., "well-born," from Old French gentil "high-born, noble, of good family" (11c., in Modern French "nice, graceful, pleasing; fine pretty"),
- from Latin gentilis "of the same family or clan," from gens (genitive gentis) "race, clan," from root of gignere "beget,"

from PIE root \*gen- "produce" (see genus).  
Sense of "gracious, kind" (now obsolete)  
first recorded late 13c.; that of "mild,  
tender" is 1550s. Older sense remains in  
gentleman
