In 1822 the word "paleontology" was invented by the editor of a French scientific journal to refer to the study of ancient living organisms through fossils.

Origin from the French word paléontologie.

Possibly originated from the Greek word paloaois "old, or ancient"

Richardson

Richardson in origin comes from the Old German name "Ricard", meaning powerful and brave. Richardson can also mean "son of Richard." The name originated in Ireland, but eventually was moved and transferred to England around 1066. The first spelling of Richardson appeared in 1381in the Yorkshire Poll Tax Returns. The actual recorded spelling of this name was dated backto 1359 in Glasgow, Scotland during the rein of King David 11 of Scotland.
