Definition: A person, typically a man, who is admired for their courage, outstanding achievements, or noble qualities.

History: A **hero** ,**heroine** for females, in Greek Mythology and folklore, was originally a demigod, their cult being one of the most distinctive features of ancient Greek religion. Later, *hero* and *heroine* came to refer to characters who, in the face of danger and adversity or from a position of weakness, display courage and the will for self sacrifice that is, heroism for some greater good of all humanity. In classical antiquity heroes such as Heracles, Perseus, and Achilles played an important role in Ancient Greek religion.
