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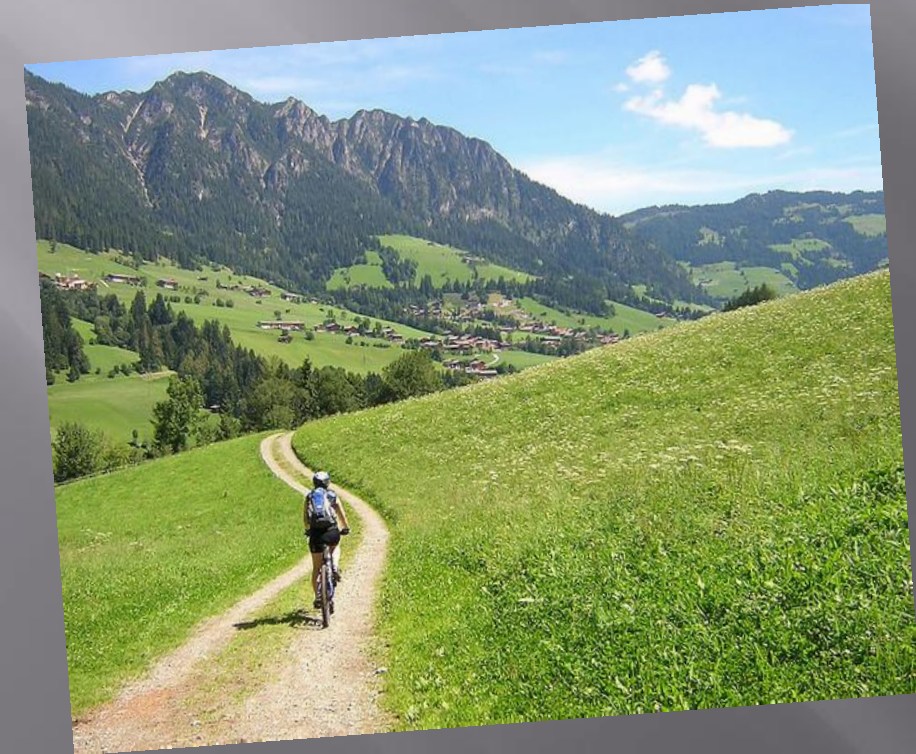
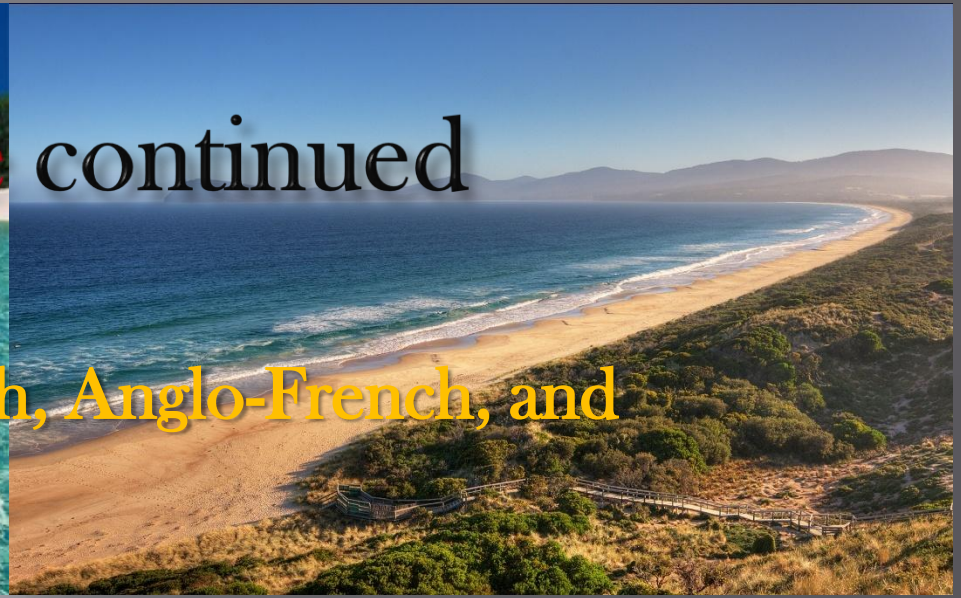
Defined: the undertaking usually involving your own risk and danger.

Origin before 1000 Middle English *gaman* or Old English *gamen*



Game continued

Defined: a physical or mental competition consisting of rules and the participation of a direct opponent to each other.

Plants or bacteria such characteristics to a region area or specific environment
