### **CONTEXT:** Literary Traditions and Beyond

#### In Days of Old When Knights Were Bold

Among the most popular figures in English literature are those of the legend of King Arthur. There may have been a real Arthur, but he would have had little to do with the Arthur of legend. Because the stories of Arthur and the knights of the Round Table have been retold by many writers for centuries, there are many versions of the stories of the king, of Queen Guinevere and Merlin, and of the court at Camelot. The most popular retelling in recent times has been *The Once and Future King*, by T. H. White (1906–1964).

In the following exercises, you will have the opportunity to expand your vocabulary by reading about the legend of Arthur. Below are ten vocabulary words that will be used in these exercises.
